

- Able to establish good rapport

### SOP Sample Skeleton

**Paragraph 1.** Start with your favorite quote and describe a life-transforming event that made you select the stream that you want to pursue. Be sure to convey your passion for the stream and not just state that you are passionate about it.

In other words, what are your reasons for choosing to undertake the specified course of study?

**Paragraph 2.** A write-up about academic performance in college, projects and the different things you pursued that helped you gravitate toward your program interest.

**Paragraph 3.** Any internship / Extracurricular activities (if applicable).

**Paragraph 4.** A write-up about academic performance and why you chose the specific program.

In other words, how is your selected course of study relevant to your previous academic and/or employment background?

**Paragraph 5.** What are your goals? What are the skills you will need to achieve those goals? How will the program help you?

In other words, how is your selected course of study relevant to your future education and/or career plans?

**Paragraph 6.** Why have you chosen to study in Country X rather than in your home country?

**Paragraph 7.** How will this course benefit you when you return to your home country?

**Paragraph 8.** Conclude your story.

## EASY WAYS OF WRITING MAIN BODY PARAGRAPHS

All the IELTS essay writing tasks have easy to remember structures that will help you to write high-scoring essays. An important part of your preparation for the exam is to learn these structures so that they come quickly to mind in the test.

For Task 2 main body paragraphs, the structure has 3 parts:

- ✓ Topic sentence
- ✓ Explanation sentences
- ✓ Example

### Constructing Body Paragraph 1

"Reading books keeps a person's mind active, whereas watching films and television is passive and does not require people to use their imagination."

To what extent do you agree or disagree with this statement?"

- ✓ Sentence 1 (Topic Sentence)

**"Reading is the best way to nurture the power of imagination."**

Topic sentence is complete. Now, you are required to add another sentence that explains the topic sentence. Remember, don't write anything new in this sentence. Use this sentence just for explaining the previous sentence as below:

- ✓ Sentence 2 (Explain the Topic Sentence)

**"When people read a story, they tend to visualize the settings and the characters involved in it."**

You've just explained the topic sentence. Now it's time to present your logic supporting the two sentences above.

- ✓ Sentence 3 (Present logic / example for the Topic Sentence)

**"For instance, most of the avid reader of Harry Potter book series were extremely disappointed when they watched the film series, because the way they created the different images in their minds was much deeper than that of the films."**

Awesome! You are almost done with the paragraph. Let's just give a concluding sentence for the discussion in this paragraph.

- ✓ Sentence 4 (Give an example or a concluding sentence)

**"This is how books keep people's creativity more active which eventually helps them in real life in terms of idea generation."**

### The Complete Body Paragraph 1

Reading is the best way to nurture the power of imagination. When people read a story, they tend to visualize the settings and the characters involved in it. For instance, most of the avid reader of Harry Potter book series were extremely disappointed when they watched the film series, because the way they created the different images in their minds was much deeper than that of the films. This is how books keep people's creativity more active which eventually helps them in real life in terms of idea generation.



The very first question type that you will face in your PTE exam is the Read Aloud question type in the PTE Speaking section. This is a simple enough question type.

You will see some text on the screen. You will have 30~40 seconds to read the text, understand it and prepare your response. After that time the microphone will be activated. You will then have 30~40 seconds to record your response.

With some practice it is possible to easily get a high score in these questions. Here are some tips and tricks that you should follow:

### **Pause at these places**

Usually you need to pause at punctuation marks – commas, full stops and conjunctions such as and, but, etc. If a sentence is very long you can also break it at a logical point. Don't over think about where to pause or not. Just follow these indicators.

### **Emphasize just the right amount**

Some people take emphasizing and stress to an extreme. You don't need to stress at every seemingly important word. If you do, you will sound very unnatural. Just pick 3~4 words, maybe one in each sentence and simply emphasize those.

### **Vary your tone properly**

Usually when you begin your sentence, you raise your tone and when you come to the end of a sentence, you lower your tone. This is an easy guideline to follow. Don't raise and lower your voice so much that it sounds like someone is singing.

### **Break through difficult words**

Do not hesitate and stop to think about difficult

words. Just keep speaking. Rush through them, replace them with a simpler similar word. Hesitation is your number one enemy in this question type.

### **Speak in larger chunks**

Someone who is good in a particular language, usually can read and speak a bigger part of a sentence in that language. To convey the same impression in English, you should try to speak a bigger part of the sentence in one go. When you practice, start by speaking 3 words at a time, then gradually increase the number of words you can speak in one go. But don't set a fixed pattern when speaking. If you always speak 3 words, 3 words, 3 words, you will sound like a robot. Mix it and make it sound natural.

### **Practice reading daily**

Simple daily practice – even reading a couple of pages from a newspaper will help you a lot in your preparation. Not only will you improve your speaking skills but also enhance your vocabulary. We strongly recommend resources like Ted Talks!

### **Be confident at all costs**

Even if you doubt your English speaking skills, when you are speaking, you should try to sound as confident as possible. Do not doubt yourself. You are just recording in a computer program. Think of it as a dumb machine.

### **Speak loudly and with full force**

It is important that your response is captured properly by the microphone. Only then can the software assess it in the right way. Ignore the others sitting around you in the exam room and just focus on your own speaking. Don't mumble words, they should come out of your mouth completely. Don't be lazy!
